Simulation Methods on Virtual Laboratories for Characterization of Functionalized Nanostructures

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1. Introduction

Within the emerging integrative concept of IoT (Internet of Things) and IIoT (Industrial Internet of Things) that are paving the way towards Digital Manufacturing Technologies and the next paradigm shift of Industry 4.0, R&D Laboratories have to be at the forefront of the transformation.

Using remotely the existing top R&D Laboratories facilities would become soon common practice, but for now basic training, teaching and R&D collaboration on specific issues can be successfully deployed. Thus, the necessary multidisciplinarytransdisciplinary expertise for running on the Digital Manufacturing Era to come will be properly achieved. A first step on producing functionalized materials to be integrated on smart applications is to properly settle their multi-physical models as to adequately consider their properties during designing the processing, postprocessing and controlling phases based on successive simulations.

2. Experimental Set-up

For settling the multi-physical models associated to R&D Labs installations and equipment, COMSOL Multiphysics is a core-function software to be used for a proper and deeper understanding of the complexdynamic relationship existing among Physics, Processing and Controlling on experimental research.

3. Methods - Use of Simulation Apps

During the description, characterization and process simulation phases for different R&D Laboratory equipment and installations (fig.1,4,8,10) the main modules of COMSOL Multiphysics [®] were extensively used, as well as its add-ons (LiveLinkTM for SolidWorks[®], LiveLinkTM for CATIA, LiveLinkTM for Excel, LiveLinkTM for MATLAB[®]). The main physical processes related to the lab installation (e.g., Mass Spectrometer) were described adapting the existing COMSOL Multiphysics (R) models [1] to the installed lab equipment data (fig.1,2) All experimental data related to the on-the-site process were archived in dedicated modules for each specific installation. These would be further on adapted to the different experimental arrays.

4. Simulation Results

Teaching "Research Process Mapping" using the principles of scientific methods within Research Labs could be a challenge and an opportunity, equally.
